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A GIRL PIONEER'S JOURNEY: MEET MARÍA FLORINDA

I come from a rural community in Guatemala. Many girls have to drop out of school after sixth grade because their parents don't have the economic resources to keep them in the classroom. Parents think that girls must get married and become mothers. Girls don't have any other options than to stop studying and get married because that is the life they know. *"I did*

This could have happened to me. The difference in my story is that I found MAIA.

I didn't want to get married. I wanted to continue learning to achieve my many goals. I want to attend university, travel to other countries, and learn languages like French. I knew I had to stay in school if I wanted these dreams to happen.

It was challenging to convince my parents to support me because of the ideas they had about girls' education. However, I talked to them about my goals and that one day I want to have a better life, not just for me but for my siblings. So, after finishing sixth grade, I started my journey at the MAIA Impact School. Here, I had a chance to develop my skills, build my self-confidence, become a leader, and overall receive the education I deserved.

Socioemotional mentorship

Mentors support Girl Pioneers to navigate life's challenges. Mentorship classes focus on leadership development, reproductive health, civic participation, and nutrition.



Launch Program

A one-year program for Girl Pioneer graduates that generates opportunity in the formal economy and success in university through professional skill development, university coaching, and workplace experience.





Family engagement

Motivated and connected families ensure that a Girl Pioneer does not have to choose between a prosperous future or her family—she can have both.



Local Leadership

Every year, we invest in over 100 hours of professional development for each MAIA educator and mentor to cultivate best practices, innovate curriculum, and improve teaching methodology.

The majority of the international team is based in Guatemala to support our 70+ member team at the Impact School.
